Dates	Course Title	Instructor
February 10 th – 12 th	BIPT 330 God's Manifest Presence	Dr. Phillip Goodson
<p>Description: This course is a study of the phenomena experienced during times of refreshing when the Holy Spirit is moving with unusual manifestations in the Body of Christ. Objectives include examining the Church's response to the manifestations of the Spirit and stirring the flames of revival.</p>		
March 10 th – 12 th	BIOT 450 Training for Reigning Part II	Dr. Ron Cottle
<p>Description: David. Special emphasis is placed upon David's life and the classrooms of preparation he had to pass through. As in the earlier course, study is given to David's call, his anointing, his character and faithfulness to God.</p>		
April 7 th – 9 th	BICC 510 Experiencing the Father's Embrace	Rev. Jack Frost
<p>Description: This course is designed to lead you deeply into Father's presence where you can receive the very thing you've been crying out for your entire life – an experience in Father's loving embrace and a restoration of childlike innocence and intimacy.</p>		
May 5 th – 7 th	BIPT 721 Advanced Deliverance II	Dr. Drew Rouse
<p>Description: This course is a study of deliverance principles from a theological viewpoint. It combines exegesis from the Book of Genesis with practical testimony to search out deliverance principles for practical application.</p>		
June 2 nd – 4 th	BIHT 510 History of the Early Church	Stan Fleming
<p>Description: This course is a history of the early Church spanning from its origins to the Council of Chalcedon in AD 451. Along with general overview, special attention will be paid to the notable people, movements, and traditions that have created a rich heritage for the modern day Church. There will also be a discussion of some notable fables that have emerged, such as <i>The DaVinci Code</i>.</p>

July 7th – 9th	BINT 560 Paul: The Man	Dr. Ron Cottle
Description: This is part one of a two-part study in the life, conversion, and travels of the Apostle Paul based upon the biblical evidence from Acts and certain Epistles. It also includes an analysis and overview of several of Paul’s letters. These are studied chronologically.		
August 11th – 13th	BICC 560 Godly Communication in Everyday Life	Dr. Michael Sedler
Description: This course is designed to help each student become more effective in his or her daily communication patterns. The foundation scripture for the course is Ecclesiastes 3:7, which states that there is “a time to be silent and a time to speak.” Areas of focus will include communication between family members.		
September 8th – 10th	BIBT805 The Holy Spirit II	Dr. Fuchsia Pickett
Description: This course is a continuation of Holy Spirit I. Topics include the gifts of the Spirit, the fruit of the Spirit and what it means to walk in the Spirit.		
October 6th – 8th	BIBT 610 Anonymous Women of Faith: Theology of Faith	Dr. Alvis Harthern
Description: This course is a study of the lives of people who demonstrated supernatural faith. Its purpose is to teach students what faith is, how to get faith, and how to live faith-based lives. The author uses descriptors to classify the types of faith exhibited by each of the women studied. The study of each type of faith (obedient, fearless, desperate, persistent, expectant, witnessing, and resurrection) is initiated with the identification of an unnamed woman in Scripture who exhibited that specific faith. Others who exhibited each kind of faith are also included.		
November 3rd – 5th	BIOT 645 The Anointing: Its Nature and How to Receive It	Dr. Ron Cottle
Description: This course centers on the Old Testament characters of Elijah and Elisha. It is intended to help students to recognize and experience their own anointing. Topics include the three winds of God, the names of the anointing, birthing a new move of God, phases of development, the crown prince, the double portion anointing, and steps into the anointing.		
December 1st – 3rd	BICC 310 A Study of Christian Marriage and Child Training	Dr. Gary Beasley
Description: This course focuses on God’s perspectives on relationships within families and offers practical counsel in applying principles to today’s life.		

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
